



These studies have revealed various aspects of the series' popularity, such as its impact on reading habits, emotional engagement, and cultural significance. For instance, Smith and Wilhelm (2010) conducted a study that examined the influence of *Harry Potter* books on children's reading habits. The research indicates that *Harry Potter* series played a crucial role in motivating children, particularly reluctant readers, to engage with books. The study identified the fantasy elements, relatable characters, and compelling storyline of the series as key factors that captured children's attention and encouraged them to read more. In terms of emotional engagement, Dalton and Suggate (2013) explored the emotional experiences of children while reading *Harry Potter* books.

The study found that children experienced various emotions, such as excitement, sadness, fear, and empathy, while reading the series. The well-developed characters and immersive narrative established a strong emotional connection with the story, resulting in a memorable and impactful reading experience for children. Additionally, the cultural significance of Harry Potter among children has been extensively discussed in the literature. Gupta and Gupta (2015) conducted a study on the cultural impact of Harry Potter series. The research found that the books have transcend- ed geographical and cultural boundaries, becoming a cultural phenomenon. The study also highlighted that the series has influenced children's social interactions, language use, and identity formation. Additionally, other studies have examined the impact of the Harry Potter series on children's moral reasoning and values. For ex- ample, Barger and White (2012) found that the series promotes prosocial behaviors, such as empathy, fairness, and justice, among young readers by presenting moral. The books have not only influenced children's reading habits but also fostered emotional engagement, cultural significance, and moral development. The captivating storytelling, relatable characters, and moral themes of the series have made it a beloved and enduring favorite among young readers worldwide.

This dissertation examines the popularity of Harry Potter among children, particularly focusing on the theme of magic. The research used a qualitative and descriptive method. The data of the research were significant expressions in the form of sentences, paragraphs, and discourses related to magic.

The present dissertation has a threefold organization. The first chapter, entitled Magic in Literature, tackles the definition of magic in the context of children's literature, characteristics of magic and its elements, the psychological appeal of magic for children, examining specific magical elements in Harry Potter and their psychological impact on children, and appreciation of how these elements contribute to the series' popularity among children. The second chapter, entitled Exploring the Magical Power and Ethics of Hogwarts, deals with the power and limitations of magic, and Hogwarts School of Witchcraft and Wizardry as a magical education institution.

The third chapter introduces and then analyzes characterization through key quotes: Harry Potter and Hermione Granger. It also tries to analyze some symbols such as the Quidditch game, the SortingHat, Harry's scar, and the Mirror of Erised.

Chapter One Magic in Literature

1.0. Introduction

1.1. The definitions and Meaning of Magic in the Context of Children's Literature

English literature for children is full of magic which is a forceful narrative device that creates sense of surprise and astonishment in the literary work. In "The Lion, the Witch, and the Wardrobe" and "The Magician's Nephew" by C.S. Lewis; magic is used as an emblematic name for imagination, artistic thinking with its theme emphasizing on belief power youth has to set themselves free from reality. (Lewis, 1950).

For instance, in "Harry Potter and the Philosophers Stone" by J.K. Rowling and the "Chronicles of Prydain" series by Lloyd Alexander; magic is used by the authors to illustrate the ordinary lifestyles of characters that are full of choices, bravery and friendships. These are the benefits through which successful book becomes able to channelize the young minds that they use critical thinking as well as they are capable of appreciating the power of imagination, and symfity by growing their budding in them self.

In children literature,magic is a figure of speech indicting fantasy, creativity and the power of trust. It offers to children the chance to get outside the box the concert universe and to discover the universe of unlimited boundaries (Lewis, 1955)

1.2 Characteristics of magic and it's elements

Magic has been understood differently throughout recorded history and is itself a broad and complex phenomenon. It encompasses a wide range of beliefs, practices, and behaviours that generally involve, though are not limited to, the use of supernat- ural forces or powers. The features of magic can vary from one culture, place, historical period, or religion to another, but there are certain elements that some magical practices across different traditions have in common.

1.2.1. Characteristics

The power of magic derives from some sort of forces or energies and it depends on the paraphernalia of the elaborate restrictions that allow them to function. Magicians most often relied on magic that provided alternatives to the world of tension that Devereux called their 'osmotic world of basic signification'. (Luhrmann, 1989).

Decorative Magic: another category. This is mostly idea-power and goal-orientation. People who tie their wills and goals to power, these rituals, can win with these rituals. Winning is really a matter of faith and focus. (Butler, 1998)

A third element that is often found in magic is the practice of adding symbols as objects and actions that are believed to carry some level of power or meaning. Spells, charms, herbs, candles, incense, and other ritualistic paraphernalia can add to the force of magic. (Frazer, 1994).

In addition, witchcraft often involves the association of supernatural beings or entities such as demons, gods, angels, or spirits. Adepts may call upon these beings to assist in their magical work or to act as intermediaries between humans and the supernatural world. (Hutton, 2001)

Thirdly, sorcery often concerns itself with secret and esoteric knowledge, the possession of which enables the practitioner to gain additional power. Numerous secrets or formulae are passed down the line, some which can be used only by the neophyte, others by the adept who has been initiated.

1.2.2. Elements

One of the most important factors of sorcery is the use of charms and enchantments. sticking to one's ideals and supporting those we care about, even when it is difficult or risky. (Sturgis, 2017.pp.1-15)

The bonds between students and instructors strengthen the Hogwarts community. (Watford, 2019. pp. 170-182)

c-Spell Complexity

Spells are intricate, requiring complex rituals and advanced magical knowledge to cast correctly. Mastery often involves experience, practice, and study of magical the- ory. (Rowling, 1997.n.p).

2.1.1.2. Potion Making

Potions here in the magical world are a crucial art that involves scientific knowledge, artistic talent together with the ability to add precision when you are making toxins with some special characteristics.(ibid)

a-Ingredients

Potions require specific magical ingredients that contribute to their effects. Such ingredients may be from ordinary herbs or some minerals as well as the ones which are difficult to get and can be found only in unexplored places and guarded by magi- cal creatures.(ibid)

b-Skill Development

Potion making is a craft that demands not just skill, but also testing, trying out different herbs, and a good knowledge of magic and the engagement of the ingredients. Staffs of potion masters, with their magical ingredients, are renown for their capability to create potions with specific properties and powerful outcomes. Rowling emphasizes sense of triumph in the face of adversity through (Rowling, 1997.n.p).

2.1.2. Limitations of Magic

Initially, he acted like the unpractical and the inconsiderate friend considering himself a comic relief character, but then proved himself a braver and more reliable comrade to Harry. Despite being faced with many challenges with his friends, he has learned to value friendship and has matured and become a trustworthy young man. Together, the trio of Harry, Ron, and Hermione overcame several obstacles and challenges that help them grow both individually and as a unit. (Rowling & Holt ,1998.pp.25-36).

These three individuals embody the qualities that define a true Gryffindor: pluck, valor ,grit, and allience. Their tales have left many young guys thirsty for glory and the bride. (It is interesting how the actions are taken by the characters in the book and not just the words that they speak. (Rowling & Rainey, 2001, pp. 36-38)

2.2.2.2. Hufflepuff House

2.2.2.2.1. Characteristics of Hufflepuff House

The core values of the Hufflepuff House are firmly focused on the three things




Figure 2 Hufflepuff House

Helga Hufflepuff thought that a person who doesn't mind waiting for something good, is a good and precious person and this way of thinking is transferred to every Hufflepuff student. (Rowling, 1998).

Loyalty is one of the defining characteristics of the Hufflepuff. Through thick and thin, they are fiercely devoted to their friends and allies. This loyalty extends beyond personal relationships; Hufflepuffs also believe in the preservation of the greater good and in being true to their principles. (Rowling, 2003).

At Hufflepuff House - among honesty, integrity and formality - being honest and being nice to everybody demonstrates the motivation of the community. Good sportsmanship and fair play are valued deeply and students are expected to engage in these types of competitions. The Quidditch team may be taken as an illustration; they play this game with these principles in mind, honour and respect to all rivals. (Rowling, 2003).

Over time, these key values still remain and keep on defining the identity of Hufflepuff House at the Hogwarts School of Witchcraft and Wizardry.

2.2.2.2. Notable Members of Hufflepuff House

Cocky Diggory and Nymphadora Tonks are the important characters who reveal the Hufflepuff house's feature of a hard working being and a loyal one, respectively.

a-Cedric Diggory

She put loyalty to her loved ones and family first and that was what got her through the thick and thin of life. She was Harry Potter's most important guardians, drawing the line to protect him and his family from continual threats. She stayed true to her words and service to those who she cared about so much, therefore being a true Hufflepuff and exemplifying their meaning. (Rowling, 2003).

positive and negative traits which he embodies as a dark magician and person who has his own agenda. (Rowling, 1997-2007).


b-Draco Malfoy




Figure 5 The Book of the Philosopher's Stone

3.1.1. Analysis of Characterization through Key Quotes

3.1.1.1. Harry Potter

(p.158) When we were reading the sto-ry in the letter, we found out about the troubled inner state of Harry, and the influ-ence of his encounter with the Mirror of Erised. Even with Henri's powerful and un-yielding desire to erase that bloody and red-rimmed face, he could not. The glass revealed what he had dreamt about, including his well-established requests, such as the granting of being able to see the lost parents once more, which fixed on the heart and his need of being related of any kind, and the pure need of having feelings of affection were engraced.

The young boy is also apathetic but upon seeing only one day after an earthquake, the idea starts to dawn on him seriously. This is what leads Harry to begin one of his worst bouts of nightmares. These nightmares are an emotional backpack, an embodiment of the work of the soul as he learned after seeing what was there. All these while, as could have been perceived in the mirror, he still emphasized in his desires and strivers for belongingness more than any other priorities even when he was sound asleep. Furthermore, the Sorting Hat communicates "You might belong in Gryffindor, where true hearts are nurtured; let your daring, nerve and heroic valour guide you there" (p.88). Harry Potter finds himself more than comfortable in his Gryffindor House as his sense of belonging at Gryffindor is strengthened. Sorting Hat pays attention to the qualities which make up a true Gryffindor during the process of mak- ing its decision whether to bestow Harry with the hat. The qualities include bravery, valour, courage and heroism. As the values mentioned here are powerfully connected with that of Harry, who manifests principles of courage many times and often stands up for what is right as depicted in the series. Being allocated into Gryffindor forges an essential link among friends, and he likewise becomes a member of a group where he perfectly fits in.

Throughout his journey, Harry encounters the Sorting Hat, who values his courage as the basis upon which he is placed in Gryffindor. This helps verify his own feelings about himself, as he finds an encouraging community where he finds acceptance, understanding, and purpose. He not only wanted to open it in private but also noted that he was being humble by doing so once again Not only, this piece shows Harry's unwillingness to be in the spotlights but also his humbler and modest ways in expressing the magic. Here we can see how this quote carries Harry's humility through as Harry shows his dislikeness of drawing attention through others by not choosing the most noisy and most flashy way of showing off his skills or an experience.

3.1.1.2. Hermione Granger

Hermione Granger, Harry Potter's mate and a dear friend of him, might serve as a sample for intelligence, dedication, and loyalty. Abundant with brainpower and seasoned by years of her magical mentorship this girl is radiantly pragmatic. Hermione

a-Intelligence

"I don't think it was an accident he let me find out how the Mirror worked" (p.219)





Figure 10 The Mirror of Erised



As a result of the profound theoretical framework of supernatural power in literature, the ethical evaluation of Harry Potter and the Philosopher's Stone, and the literature and magical power of Hogwarts exploration.
